Keynote Speaker

Dr. Steinke has been on La Salle's staff since 2012 as the Program Assessment and Effectiveness Research Specialist. Her research interests include evidence-based practice, trauma informed care, and the linkages between client characteristics, treatment interventions, and outcomes for youth in treatment. Dr. Steinke actively presents on these topics at regional and national conferences for organizations including the American Association of Children's Residential Centers and the American Society of Criminology. She is currently representing La Salle School in the 'Change in Mind' brain science cohort sponsored by the national Alliance for Strong Families and Communities.

In addition to her work at LaSalle, Dr. Steinke is an adjunct professor in the University at Albany's School of Criminal Justice, the College of Saint Rose in Albany and the State University of New York at Plattsburgh.

Dr. Steinke earned bachelor's degrees in criminal justice and Spanish at the University of Nevada, Reno, and continued her work in Criminal Justice at the UAlbany's School of Criminal Justice. She was introduced to child welfare work through her graduate work with the University's Service Outcomes Action Research (SOAR), a project designed to aid child welfare providers in the development and testing of a theory of change to help determine what methods work best with which clients.
